FMA Australia and Tungsten Young FM Practitioner Award

The FMA Australia and Tungsten Young FM Practitioner Award recognises the importance of encouraging and developing the skills and professionalism of talented young FM practitioners who are the key to the future of our industry.

The recipient of the award will be an exceptionally capable FM practitioner who has demonstrated professional development of their competence, an overall level of excellence in their work and a capacity to make a significant contribution to their organisation's outcomes.

Eligibility

- > Self nomination and third party nominations are welcome.
- > The entrant must be no older than 30 years of age on the closing date of the awards.
- > The entrant may be part of an in-house or outsourced FM practice in any industry sector.
- > Nominees must be resident in Australia.
- > The entrant must be a current member of FMA Australia.

Presentation and Format of Entries

Entries for this award category must be presented in four clearly marked sections:

Part A: completed entry form.

Part B: executive and profile summary detailing a brief biography of the entrant to be used for presentation purposes, promotional activities and media releases.

Part C: addresses the evaluation criteria.

Part D: supporting documents including, but not limited to: testimonials, reference letters, press and magazine articles, certificates/awards and other material or reports that support your submission.

17.00, Monday 31 March 2008**

The winner of the FMA Australia and Tungsten Young FM Practitioner Award will receive a certificate, award and a cash prize.

Note:

- > Submissions must be no longer than 2500 words.
- > All entries must submit one bound hard copy and four electronic versions provided on CDs.

Please ensure all responses are in the context of quantified and measured outcomes with accompanying documentation where appropriate.

List your FM business and FM career achievements to date.

2. Key roles and responsibilities where you have contributed to the operational advancement and development of the FM profession

Detail projects and achievements in the following key areas:

- Judgement
- Business improvement
- Issue management
- Influencing
- Prioritisation
- Planning

3. The Future of the FM Profession

How and why does the FM profession need to evolve to sustain the focus afforded by the Australian Government facilities management action agenda?
